\$2.4m funding to help manage iconic Murray sites

The State Government has secured funding from the Murray Darling Basin Authority to help manage two ecologically-important sites on the River Murray.

The Department of Environment, Water and Natural Resources (DEWNR) has secured \$2.4 million to assist the implementation of The Living Murray Program in South Australia during 2013/14.

River Murray Minister Ian Hunter says the funding will help to manage the Chowilla Floodplain (part of the Chowilla Lindsey-Walpole Icon Site) and the Lower Lakes, Coorong and Menzies Creek (LLCMM) Icon Site.

"The majority of funding contributes to ecological monitoring programs at both sites," he says.

"The information gathered by the monitoring helps DEWNR prioritise the delivery and use of environmental water, and ensure environmental water flows through the system to the Coorong and the Murray Mouth.

"The ecological monitoring will provide information for the commissioning of major new environmental water delivery infrastructure on the Chowilla Floodplain, and advise on on-going storage operations."

The funding agreements with the MDBA will support:

- development of environmental watering bids for the LLCMM and Chowilla
- delivery of environmental water
- operations planning for new and upgraded environmental water management infrastructure on the Chowilla Floodplain
- delivery of broad-scale ecological monitoring programs at both sites, including fish, vegetation, bird, groundwater and invertebrate monitoring
- engagement with community, scientists, and Traditional Owner groups
- communication
- planning and reporting
- operational advice.

My Coorong Rules at Raukkan - Minister Hunter joins River Murray Operations staff and Ngarrindjeri community for 'My Coorong Rules' at Raukkan

Minister Hunter, River Murray Operations Branch staff and guests from the Major Projects Branch and the Ngarrindjeri community joined forces earlier this month for the 'My Coorong Rules' reconciliation event. The event was initiated after the River Murray Operations team was awarded a grant in the DEWNR Reconciliation Competition.



The event kicked off with a guided historical tour of the township of Raukkan, which recognised the early missionary work of the Point McLeay Mission, followed by a tour of the mission gallery, which features historical images of indigenous people including the famous David Unaipon. Mr Unaipon lived at Point McLeay Mission and is best remembered as an inventor, poet and spokesperson for indigenous rights, and features on our \$50 note.

The Raukkan part of the tour concluded with a modern day perspective on how the community operates today and the success of natural resource management projects including a native plant nursery and Teringie Wetland management.

As the name of the event suggests, 'My Coorong Rules' had a distinct cooking theme. For lunch, River Murray Operations staff shared food representing their cultural heritage (English, Italian, Afghan and Ukranian), while the Raukkan community reciprocated by sharing traditional Ngarrindjeri delicacies.

It was a great chance to learn about the mix of cultures within the group, while enjoying some new food and generally getting to know one another.

'Cuisine is central to all cultures and is a great way for cultures to connect' said Andrew Beal, Director of River Murray Operations. 'The support by the Department towards reconciliation and making this event possible is also greatly appreciated'.

The day continued with a visit to Camp Coorong where staff were given cultural insights by Aunty Ellen Trevorrow, who demonstrated how to weave traditional baskets using the locally indigenous rush (*Cyperus gymnocaulos*).

Staff enjoyed being taught how to make a mat, basket or bracelet while also learning from Aunty Ellen about Ngarrindjeri culture, life and traditions.

2013 Frog Monitoring in the Lower Lakes

It has been a great start to the Natural Resources SA Murray-Darling Basin Frog monitoring season with eight species recorded so far which includes the sighting of a Southern Bell frog (*Litoria raniformis*) at a CLLMM GWLAP Community revegetation site at Clayton Bay. The Painted frog (*Neobatrachus pictus*) has also been sighted at 6 sites in the Lower Lakes; Teringie Wetland, Milang Snipe Sanctuary, Hindmarsh Island, Point Sturt and 2 community monitored sites in Goolwa. While the Painted frog population status is listed as secure they are not generally encountered during frog monitoring from September to December. The Painted frog is a burrowing species like the Banjo frog (*Limnodynastes dumerilii*).

You don't need to be an expert at identifying frog species or their calls to participate in frog monitoring, all it takes is a five minute recording and completing a site data sheet once a month from September to December. Frog Monitoring loan kits are available at the Goolwa Visitor Information Centre, Lakes Hub Milang & Meningie and the Strathalbyn Natural Resource Centre. Desalination plant excursion - feedback letter

Hi Amelia,

Many thanks to you and Carole for organising the trip to the desalination plant last week. Karen and I both thought that this plant was a white elephant and had been commissioned and put into moth balls for future emergencies. We were both surprised to hear that up to 50% of the entire Adelaide water supply over the last few years has been supplied by the desalination plant at Lonsdale and piped throughout the entire Metro area using the interconnectors from Happy Valley. I was interested to hear about the best practises adopted by the manufacturer designed for long life and reduced energy need using the wasted energy from the high pressure pumps.

SA Water did a great job talking about the plant and reinforcing the fact that this plant is an insurance policy as proven in the recent floods in Queensland when the water management system was overrun by heavily polluted flood waters and could not supply drinking water to the residents. Their desalination plant was ramped up to 100% and within 2 hours was producing fresh drinking water for the area.

We probably need a Government / SA Water education session to the public letting us all know that this plant was specifically designed to sit idle then ramp up to 100% in 10% increments within a few hours when needed. All this with skeleton staff as the plant is fully automated.

We would thoroughly recommend trips like these to anyone interested in our natural resources and our water security.



The History Spot

Chronicle (Adelaide) Thursday 29th June 1933



This map shows the sites of the barrages proposed to be erected at the mouth of the River Murray to prevent the ingress of salt water to Lakes Alexandrina and Albert and the lower reaches of the river.

- (1) The Goolwa channel. This is about four miles south of Goolwa, and a little north of the mouth of the river. It is actually the bed of the Murray, and of considerable depth on the eastern side, but on the west will meet Reedy Island, which is low-lying land, where an embankment will be necessary. A barrage across the main channel would include sluice gates, which could be lowered if the river is in flood.
- (2) A creek running between Hindmarsh and Mundoo Islands, necessitating only a short structure.
- (3) Mundoo channel, extending from the island of that name to Ewe Island. At this point a solid bank was erected many years ago, and destroyed later owing to a fear that the obstruction would cause floods up river.
- (4) A shallow channel between Ewe Island and Tauwitcherie Island. It is some distance across, but the cost of the work at this point would not be great, as only a bank would be required.
- (5) This channel, which is the widest of all, extends from Tauwitcherie Island to Pelican Point, on the peninsula dividing Lake Alexandrina and Lake Albert. The water is very shallow and the erection of a bank would be the main work required. The estimated cost of the Goolwa channel is £328,000, and of the four other channels £221,000. If the Federal and three State Governments concerned agree to the amendment of the present Murray River Agreement, which proposes to reduce the original expenditure from more than £5,000,000 to approximately £1,300,000, including the cost of the barrages at the Murray Mouth. South Australia's share of the outlay will be £300,000.




